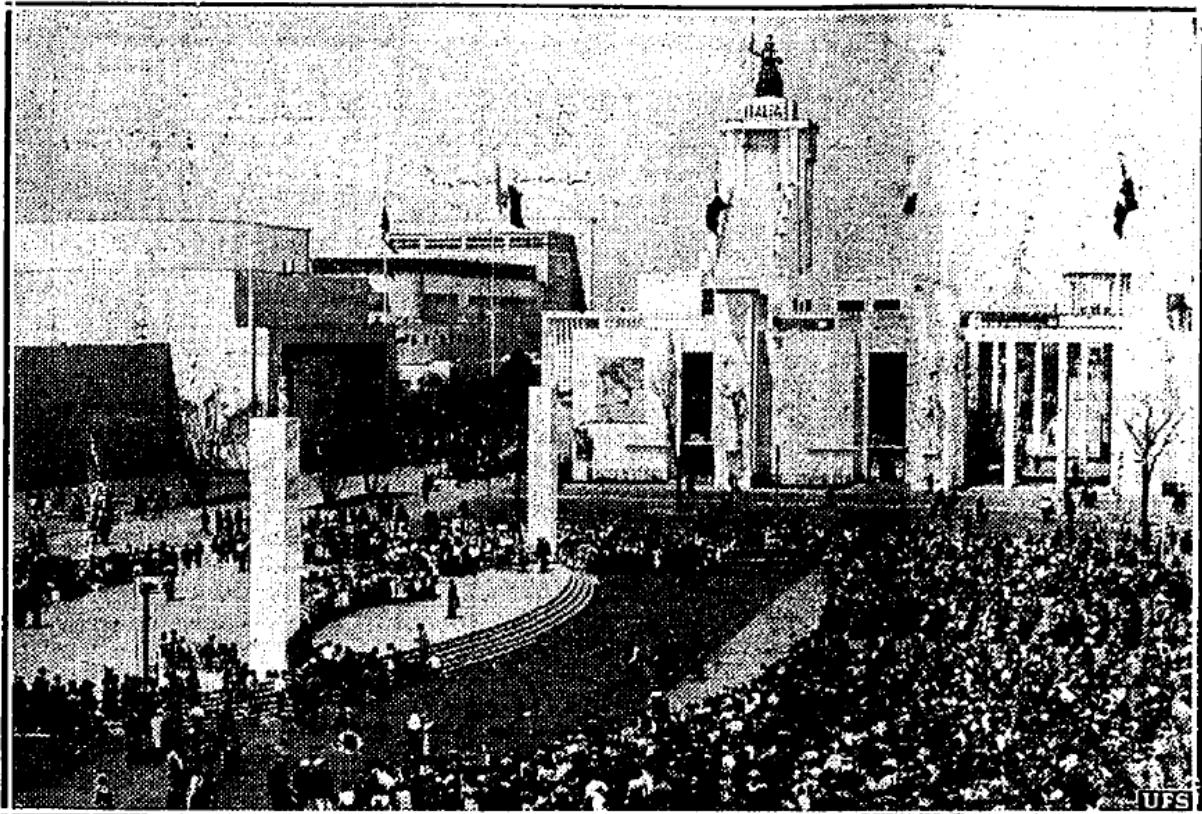

Death-19390302: Colonel James M. Stewart, former prominent resident of this city dies in Little Rock. Body will be brought for burial in City Cemetery Friday morning. Colonel James M. Stewart, 97, Confederate Veteran, former clerk of the Circuit Court of St. Francis Co., died Wednesday, Mar.1,1939, at his home in Little Rock, 200 Gaines Street. Mr. Stewart moved from Forrest City in 1890. His death occurred on his birthday anniversary. Born in 1842 at Collierville, Tenn., 24 miles east of Memphis, Colonel Stewart came to Arkansas with his parents when he was 13. His father operated a sawmill at Madison, four miles from Forrest City. When the war between the states broke out, his parents at first refused to allow him to enlist because of his youth., Finally he was granted permission and joined Hart's regiment at Forrest City under Paul M. Cobbs. The regiment originally was a cavalry unit, but was dismounted and became an infantry unit in General McRae's brigade. He served in Arkansas throughout the war and in the battle of Prairie Grove, suffered a bullet wound in the thigh which forced him to remain in a hospital for three weeks. He was adjutant in Hart's regiment at the close of the war. He returned to Forrest City after the war and played a leading part in the development of the city. The city's development began after the famous Southern general, General Nathan

Bedford Forrest built a construction camp there and began work on the railroad from Memphis to Little Rock. Colonel Stewart served as circuit clerk of St. Francis Co. for 12 years. He was one of the original stockholders of the Bank of Eastern Arkansas and helped to organize it in 1866. He also was one of a group which built the Marion Hotel at Forrest City. He was in the insurance business here under the firm name Stewart & Taylor. The firm now is known as Taylor-Knight & King. He was a Mason and held many honors in Confederate veteran organizations. At one time he was elected general of the Order of Stars and Bars. Colonel Stewart became Secretary of the Arkansas Building and Loan Assoc. in Little Rock. Later he wrote insurance, and early in the 1920's, became owner with Garland Tillar of a 320 acre tract on the Arch Street pike, which they developed into an addition to Little Rock. Colonel Stewart is survived by a son, Dr. Elbert Stewart of Little Rock, and a daughter, Mrs. Mary Elise Stewart (J. W.) Naylor of Forrest City. The body will arrive on the Rock Island train Friday morning, with services and burial at City Cemetery. Death-19390313-Clarence McCollum, 26 year old grocery man of Greasy Corner, is being held in the St. Francis Co. jail here today on a manslaughter charge in connection with the death Saturday night, March 11,1939, of Bob Hickman, 45 year old carpenter of Hughes. McCollum's bond has been set at \$500. Coroner Parham Christopher said this morning that the inquest held yesterday at Hughes, the coroner's jury returned the verdict that Hickman's death was the result of a heavy blow received on the head when he was struck with a stone thrown by McCollum. Deputy Mitchell Taylor reports that the two had been engaged in a fight on the streets of Hughes at about 9:30 pm Saturday

night. Hickman is survived by a wife and two daughters, one 13, and one 7. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon.

Death-19390314-Winfield Davis, prominent St. Francis Co. farmer, passes away at Memphis Baptist Hosp. last night following a long illness. Services to be held this afternoon at Stevens FH, and interment at City Cemetery. A native of Forrest City, Mr. Davis was born on June 19,1883, the son of the late Thomas Asbury Ramsay Davis and Anna Jones Alley Davis. He lived the greater part of his life at the Davis ancestral home located west of Forrest City where he maintained farming interests. The youngest of seven children, Mr. Davis was the last to be claimed by death. His brothers and sisters preceded him in death as follows: Benjamin Davis, Jan.18,1868; Sudie Davis, Jan.29,1893; Charles A. Davis, Nov.29,1893; Henry A. Davis, Oct.12, 1920; Mattiella Davis, Jul.2,1928; Tommie Anna Davis Beazley, Dec. 11,1934. On Aug. 17,1911, he was married to Mrs. Kate Fields in Memphis, and to this union were born three children: Thomas Fields Davis, Memphis; Richard and Margaret Davis of Forrest City. F. Puckett, whose body pierced with a bullet was found in the bed room of Mrs. Davis at Hillcrest, shortly after midnight, Aug.14,1938. It is believed that Mrs. Davis was jealous of Helen, wife of Eugene Puckett. The father of Puckett was the first to take the stand and testified that his son had frequently stayed at Hillcrest for weeks at time. Other witnesses who testified were Dr. W. A. Winter, Dr. J. S. Davidson, and Frank Hunter. The doctors said the bullet entered through the back. Mr. Hunter, formerly of Marianna, came from Los Angeles, Calif. to testify, as he was there that night. Jury chosen: W. R. Ferguson, Fred G. Moseley, T. E. Christopher, Palmer Hobbs, W. J. Baker, Edgar Lindsey, Thomas W. Stout, O. L. Kinder, Jim Edgar, Frank Burkhart, John Ellis and Jack Pettus. World-19390922-Washington-President Roosevelt asked Congress to repeal the arms embargo feature of the present neutrality law, passed in 1937 by Congress, and substitute a Cash and carry system of dealing with nations at war yesterday. Berlin-Nazi and Soviet armies split Poland today while next door Rumania sought to suppress terrorist remnants of the Iron Guard organization with concentration camps and firing squads.

World-19390929-Berlin-Russia and Germany put continuance of European war up to Britain and France and agree on partition of Poland. London-Great Britain will reject the Russian-German demand for an immediate peace despite an implied threat in the new Nazi-Communist agreement that unless the allies pull off the war on Germany's terms, Russia may join in against them.

World-19391002-London-Admiralty cautions all ships in South Atlantic after British steamship Clement sunk by heavily armed enemy vessel. British report air battle over Siegfried Line. Britain and France ready for a finish fight after rejecting the German-Russian offer of peace. Washington-Sect. of State Cordell Hull rejects the conquest of Poland by Germany and Russia. They will continue to deal with the present Polish government reorganized in France.

World-19391003-London-Germany claims they sunk the British carrier Royal Ark, but British War Ministry said the big ship is safe in her allotted station.

World-19391004-Moscow-Russia plans to continue trade with Germany and Great Britain at the same time. They continue to rent Norwegian ships to carry on war time trade with Great Britain and opened negotiations with Sweden and Denmark to rent their ships. North Sea-A reported air raid by German bombers on British battleships Barham and Ramilles, and the French warship Dunkirque.

World-19391016-Berlin-Germany says submarine sunk British ship Royal Oak and put the British battle cruiser Repulse out of commission. London-Survivors of the French liners Bretagne and Lousiane said today that German submarines attacked their ships without warning and killed or wounded more than 40 persons by shelling them as lifeboats were being lowered. British lost 786 lives in the attack on the battleship Royal Oak out of 1,200 officers and men in the ship.

World-19391018-London-Offices of the Ellerman lines announced today that a German submarine had sunk the British steamer, City of Mandalay in the Atlantic Ocean. It is believed the crew was saved by the American freighter, Independence Hall.

World-19391019-Paris-An Agency radio news agency dispatched from La Harve reported today that the 11,502 ton French freighter Vermont had been sunk in the Atlantic on the France-Gulf of Mexico route, but that the crew was safe. Washington-Senate isolationists agreed at a conference today to accept a limitation of debate on the administration's neutrality bill. They predicted a vote on the measure late this week.

World-19391030-London-German sub sinks another British ship, the steamer Malabar In the Atlantic today. Seventy of seventy five crewmen were rescued and landed in at a port in Western England.

World-19391031-Moscow-Premier and Foreign Commissar V. M Molotove tonight denounced Great Britain as the aggressor in addressing an extraordinary session of the Supreme Soviet Council.
